

American Plum (*Prunus americana*)

Native to Nebraska and well adapted to a wide variety of soil and climatic conditions. Forms dense thickets ideal for outside rows of windbreaks and wildlife habitat. Birds use thickets for nesting, feeding and resting areas; twigs are preferred source of browse for deer, rabbits in winter. White flowers bloom in May, red/purple plums ripen in September. Earliest ripening fruit is usually the sweetest and makes the best jelly.

Gambel Oak (*Quercus gambelii*)



Gambel Oak is a deciduous small tree/ large shrub that is widespread in southwestern United States. Provides dense groves or thickets. Produces acorns for wildlife. Although Gambel oak wood is hard and dense, its branches are irregular and crooked, making them flexible enough to bend without breaking. It flourishes in full sun and is drought tolerant.

Redosier Dogwood (*Cornus sericea*)



An open, spreading, multi-stemmed, medium to large shrub for farmstead/field windbreaks and riparian plantings.

Horizontal branches at the base. Fruit and twigs are used by several species of wildlife, such as robins, cedar waxwings, rabbits and deer. Provides dense cover for several wildlife species.

Woods' Rose (*Rosa woodsii*)

Woods' rose fruits (hips) remain on the plant throughout the winter, and eaten by insects, birds, small mammals, and large mammals. Antelope, mule deer, white-tailed deer, and elk browse the leaves and branches. Plant provides cover for many birds, small mammals and fish.



Sandcherry (*Cotoeaster acutifolia*)



Sandcherry is a low growing shrub native to western Nebraska. Has showy white flowers in May and produces small, sweet, purplish-black cherries in July. Sandcherry shrubs can tolerate hot, dry conditions, and prefers well-drained soils. The cherries are especially good for making jelly or jam.
